WHY FAMILY WORSHIP?

When a child is baptized in our midst and made a member of the church of Jesus Christ, the child's family and the congregation promise to be active in nurturing that child's faith. In worship, we work together to do just that – to nurture our children in their faith, and to be nurtured by them in return. Children give us the gift of trust and a fresh point of view; adults share the gift of acceptance, experience and wisdom of the church through the ages. Worship is one of the basic ways people learn what it means to be Christian. Children learn worship by worshiping with the congregation. To worship as a family allows parents to be role models for their children within the worshipping community.

The United Church of Christ practices open communion, inviting anyone who acknowledges Jesus Christ as the Lord and Savior to partake. It is up to individual congregations to decide if that includes children before they are confirmed. St. Paul UCC has a policy of leaving this decision to the discretion of the children's parents. Some parents feel strongly that their children should not take communion until they are confirmed, and we honor that decision. Other parents feel they would like their children to participate in communion from an early age. That decision is also honored. Please try to experience a Communion service this summer as a family. A Communion service is the first Sunday of every month.

There will be cool music, exciting science, creative crafts, fun recreation and memorable Bible Stories.



FREEDOM SCHOOL



Some of you may have heard of the faith based organization, Deaconess Foundation. If you haven't, the Deaconess Foundation's mission is to improve "the health of the Metropolitan St. Louis community and its people. They envision a community that values the health and well-being of all children and gives priority attention to the most vulnerable. Their strategy is to achieve positive outcomes for children and youth through collaborative engagement and investment with diverse partners to improve systems and sustain actions that have long-term impact on the health and well-being of children.

Did you know?

- There are nearly 650,000 kids in metropolitan St. Louis.
- 64% of students in East St. Louis graduate.
- In Madison County, Illinois, one in 5 children live in poverty.
- Child abuse and neglect increased 27% from 2006 to 2014 in Madison County.
- During 2007-2009, the infant mortality rate in St. Clair County was 8.1 per 1,000 live births, compared with 6.0 compared to the rest of the state of Illinois.

Teaming up with the Children's Defense Fund (CDF), the largest child advocacy organization in the United States, The Deaconess Foundation is putting on four Freedom Schools in the St. Louis area. The sites, which includes Christ The King UCC, Deaconess Center for Child Well-Being, Peace United Church of Christ and Saint John's Church (The Beloved Community) will serve a total of 175 scholars recruited from Saint Louis Public Schools, Hazelwood and Webster Groves School Districts and the UCC congregations. This seven-week program provides literacy building activities, empowerment, meals, snacks and activities, including field trips, at no charge to families.




**Church BBQ Picnic

THE SOUL OF AN INSTITUTION: EVEN CHURCH

(The following quotes were shared during our devotion and prayer time at the May meeting of the Consistory.)

Does an Institution Have a Soul?

I think Teresa (of Avila) and John (of the Cross) would have been entranced by twentieth-century social systems theories, which propose that any grouping of people is more than the sum of its parts; it is a system with its own life, an entity in many ways like a person. Each family, community, church, business, even nation or culture has characteristics and experiences that constitute a life of its own. Like the individuals who make them up, groups can be seen as growing and learning, yearning and dreaming, decaying and dying. An obvious question in this context is whether social systems might be said to have (or be) souls, ... If a group derives its being, energy and characteristics from the mutual interactions of its constituents, then it can be said to have at least some soul qualities.

The Soul is Tough: The Soul is Shy


The soul is like a wild animal...tough, resilient, resourceful, savvy and self-sufficient: it knows how to survive in hard places. I learned about these qualities during my bouts with depression. In that deadly darkness, the faculties I had always depended on collapsed. My intellect was useless; my emotions were dead; my will was impotent; my ego was shattered. But from time to time, deep in the thickets of my inner wilderness, I could sense the presence of something that knew how to stay alive even when the rest of me wanted to die. That something was my tough and tenacious soul. Yet despite its toughness, the soul is also shy. Just like a wild animal, it seeks safety in the dense underbrush, especially when other people are around. If we want to see a wild animal, we know that the last thing we should do is go crashing through the woods yelling for it to come out. But if we will walk quietly into the woods, sit patiently at the base of a tree, breathe with the earth, and fade into our surroundings, the wild creature we seek might put in an appearance. We may see it only briefly and only out of the corner of an eye – but the sight is a gift we will always treasure as an end in itself.

Unfortunately, community in our culture too often means a group of people who go crashing through the woods together, caring the soul away. In spaces ranging from congregations to classrooms, we preach and teach, assert and argue, claim and proclaim, admonish and advise, and generally behave in ways that drive everything original and wild into hiding. Under these conditions, the intellect, emotions, will and ego may emerge, but not the soul: we scare off all the soulful things, like respectful relationships, goodwill and hope.

The soul of an institution or church is the agent of divine spark within. The soul is the authentic and truest self of the institution; the source of its divine calling and character; the protector of institutional integrity. Tending the soul of the institution is more than a simple call to prayer, and it requires more than slapping a scripture verse on top of good business practice. It is more than understanding the culture, strategy and spirituality of a congregation. It requires basic leadership orientations that may seem at odds with traditional business practices of leadership. May we all take the lead from Parker Palmer and spend more time as the church like a quiet walk in the woods, sitting patiently at the base of a tree, breathing with the earth, and fading into our surroundings: then the peace of Christ, which we seek, may make its appearance.


